The Drugs Monitoring Platform is managed by the Paris Pact Initiative, the Afghan Opiate Trade Project of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the UNODC Regional Office for Central Asia (ROCA).

This is a unique global online tool for collecting, monitoring and sharing a wide range of drug-related data and features an interactive online mapping resource.

The Drugs Monitoring Platform provides real-time information and analysis on the illicit global trade in opiates, including details on cultivation, production and trafficking. This information includes up-to-date drug and precursor seizure news, details of drug and precursor prices and data related to poppy cultivation in Afghanistan. The platform also contains details of border crossing points, drug treatment centers and counter-narcotics training centers, with a focus on West and Central Asia. Currently, over 203,000 drug seizure cases are registered on the Platform, all with geographic coordinates to pinpoint their location.

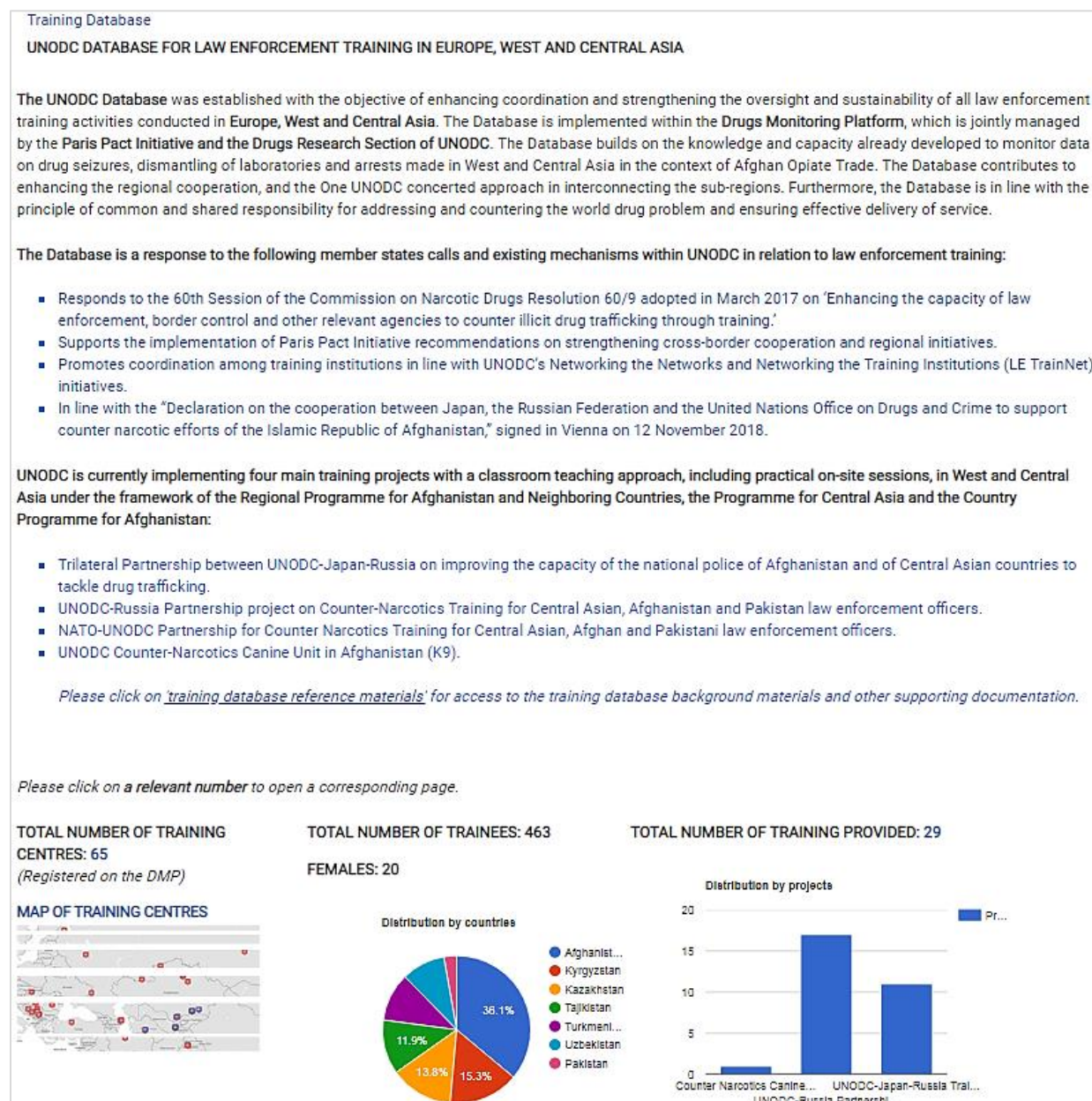
Figure 2 Locating the Training Database

Introduction to the Training Database

Database Users

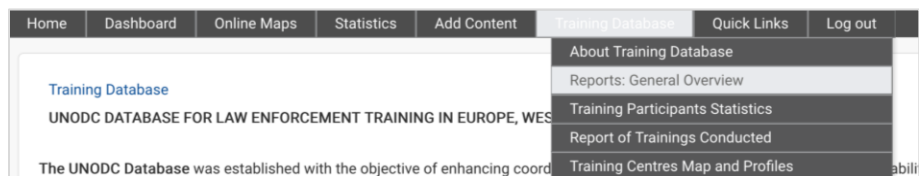
There are two distinct levels of access to the information contained in the training database known as 'user roles'.

- User Group 1: Includes UNODC managers who can enter data into the database, can access the list of training participants and who use the reports generated by the training database to support the implementation of their respective capacity building projects.
- User Group 2: Anyone who has a registered user account for the DMP and can access the training database's summary report pages excluding details of individual training participants.

The '[Reports: General Overview](#)' page is the primary location for any summary of information contained within the Training Database. The '[Reports: General Overview](#)' page is divided into four sections of information:

- Training Centres: For details regarding the number of trainings training provided by individual training institutions, and for those with managerial level access', details of all training participants as well a profile and a geo-mapping of law enforcement training institutions;
- Training Participant Statistics: This includes information on training participants broken down by the total number of trainees, the individual's country of origin, professional rank, gender and government employer and the number of trainings provided to date, broken down by location and year;
- Training Statistics: Statistics broken down by individual project and project phase; and
- Drug Seizure Statistics.

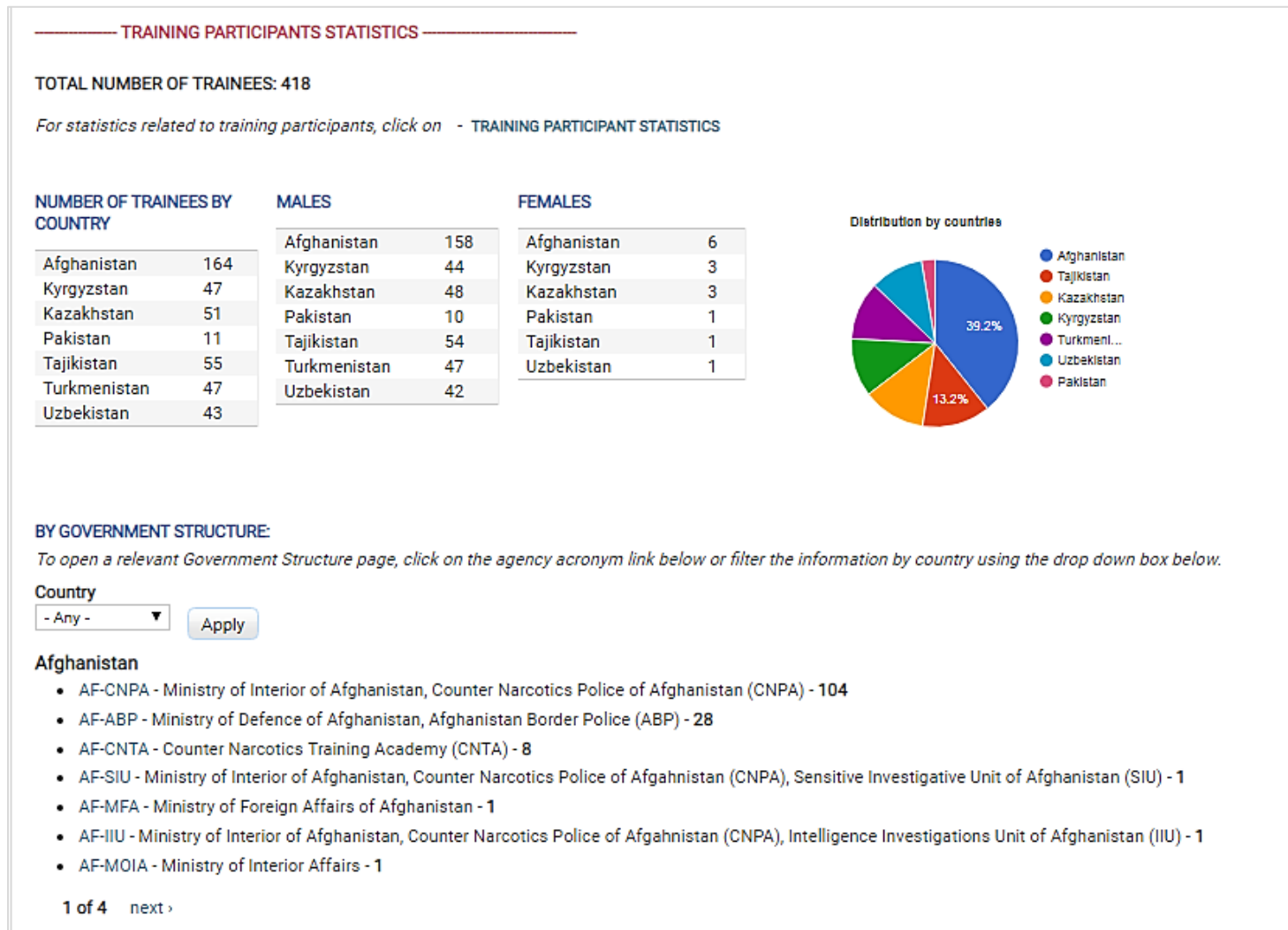

Ministry of Interior of Afghanistan, Counter Narcotics Police of Afghanistan (CNPA)

The Counter Narcotic Police of Afghanistan (CNPA) was set-up in 2009 in order to conduct counter narcotics investigations, operations and drug seizures. The CPNA has offices located all 34 provinces of the country and consists of 3,200 personnel.

The CNPA have received training, advisory and mentoring support from several international counterparts including the United States Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) and the United Kingdom's National Crime Agency (NCA).

The CNPA consists of multiple specialized units including the Special Investigation Unit responsible for investigating smuggling networks, a Judicial Unit composed of judges, attorneys, courts which undertakes in-depth investigations of drug trafficking networks.

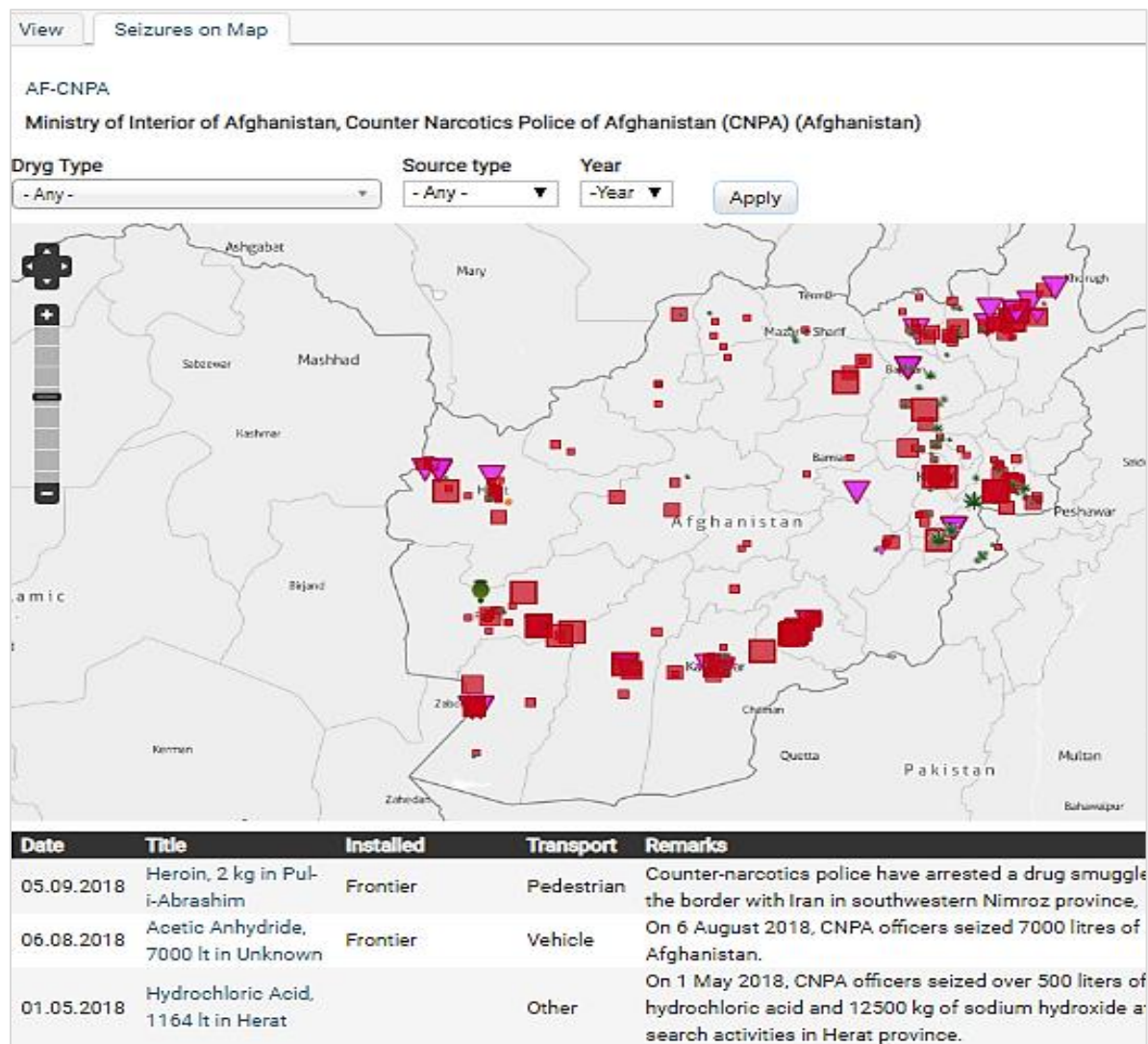
The CNPA has also established: a special unit consisting of 300 personnel trained by international advisors which provides support to eliminate narcotics by support of law enforcement of DEA administration which consists of 300 personnel and trained by US advisors and trainers. They have the responsibility to support this unit on their investigation and operations; a special chemical unit to handle drug eradication issues and violent detainees involved in drug trafficking; district teams responsible for district level enforcement and detention of traffickers; and Air Units which support local level operations.

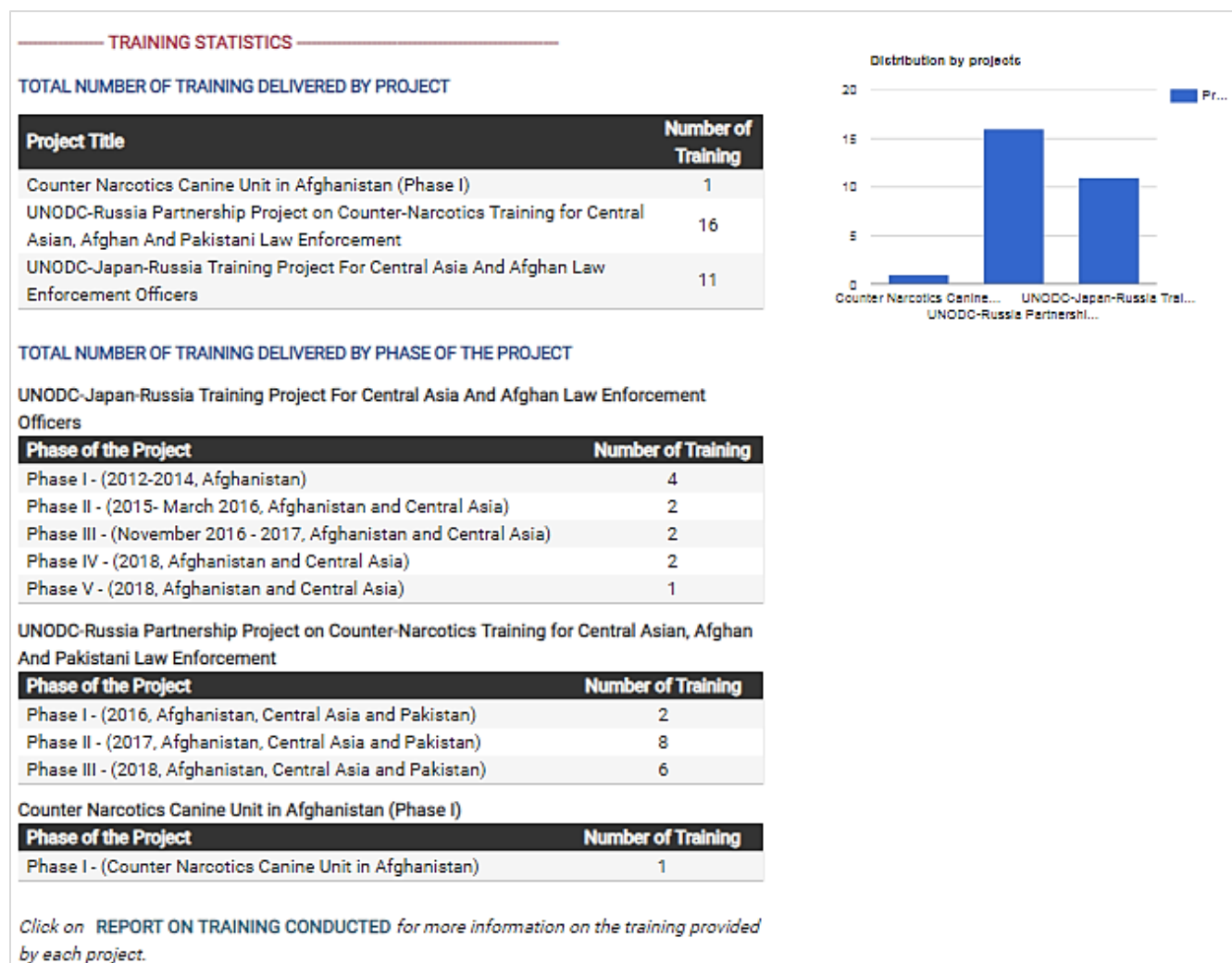

Figure 8 Government Structures and Individual Drug Seizures Map



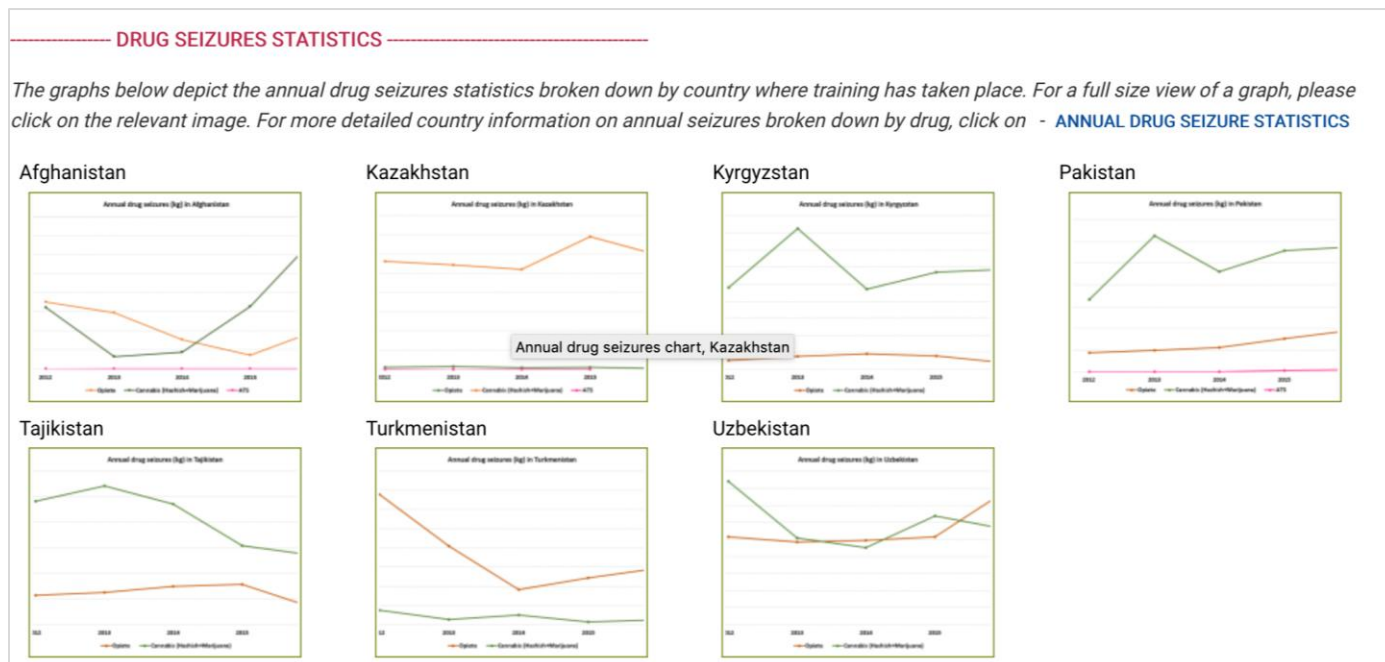

Figure 13 Training Participants Statistics page - by year, country and service provider/project

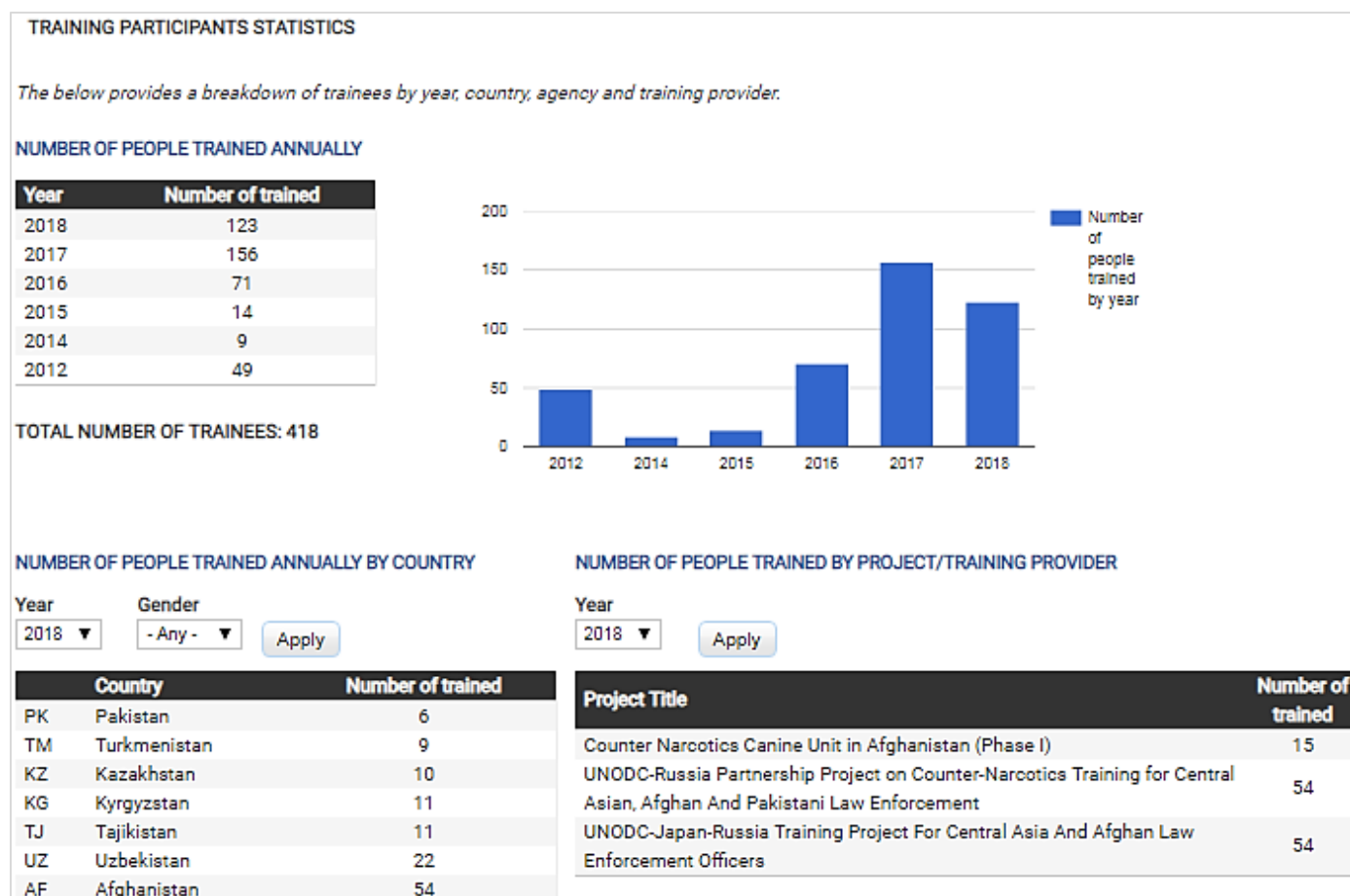


Figure 14 Training Participants Statistics page - by agency and combined by number, country and service provider/project

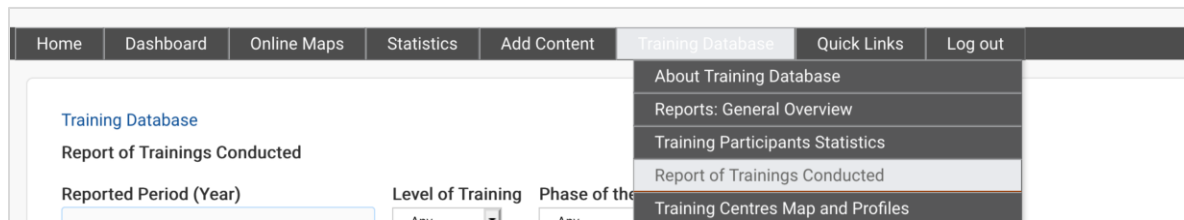



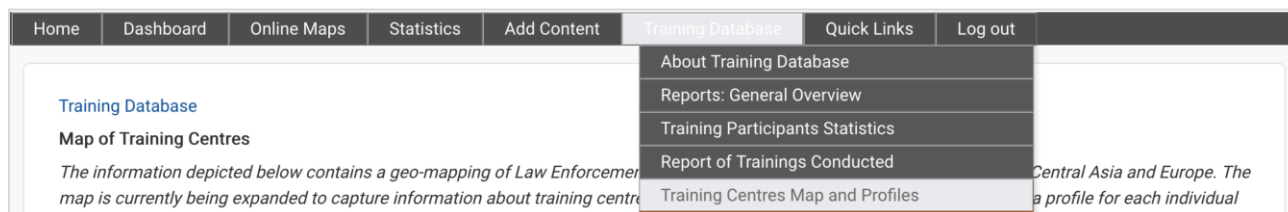

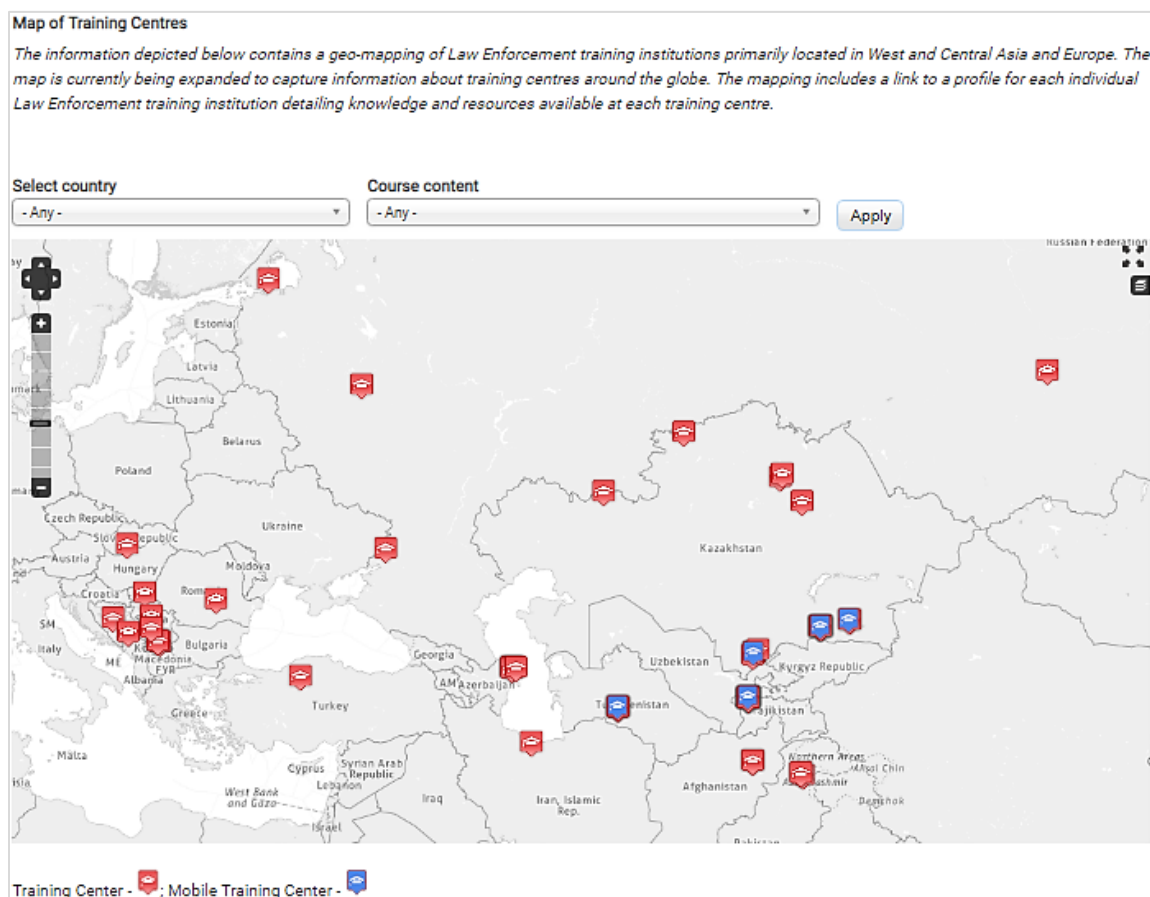

Figure 24 Navigating the 'Course Content' drop down menu

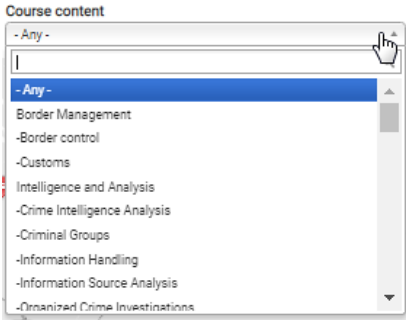
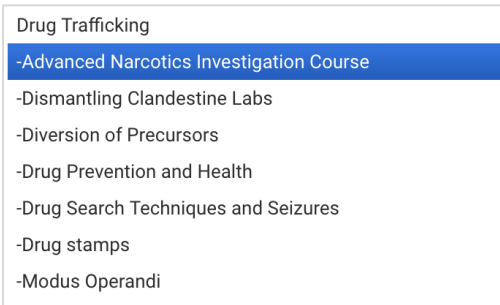


Figure 25 Sample courses by the theme of 'drugs'

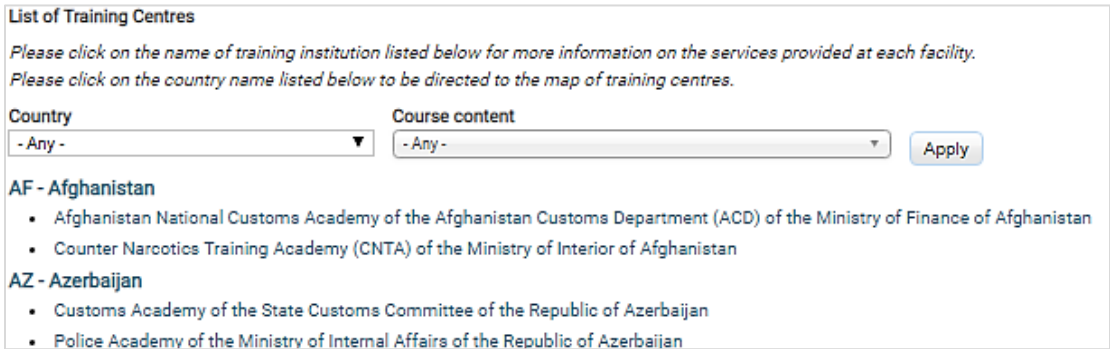


Figure 28 Accessing information about a training center by country name



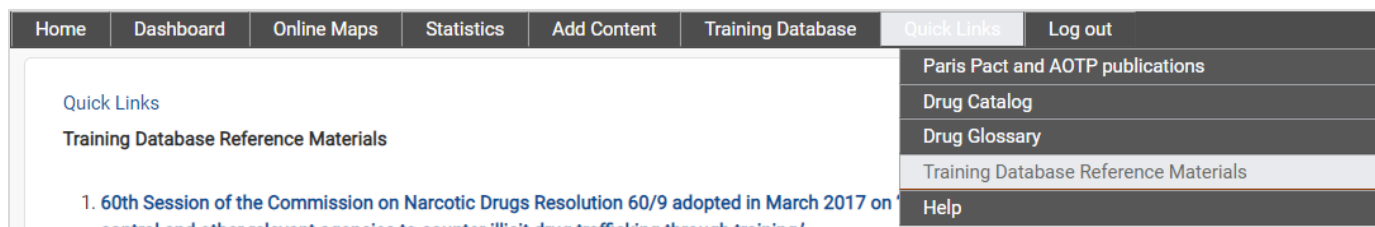

Training Database Reference Materials

- 1. 60th Session of the Commission on Narcotic Drugs Resolution 60/9 adopted in March 2017 on 'Enhancing the capacity of law enforcement, border control and other relevant agencies to counter illicit drug trafficking through training.'**

Resolution 60/9 adopted at the 60th Session of the Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) in March 2017, stresses the quick impact and relevance of law enforcement training and reiterates the importance of strengthening the capacities of law enforcement agencies to respond to drug-related threats.
- 2. Paris Pact Expert Working Recommendations on Law Enforcement Training in Support to Cross-border Cooperation, Lyon, France 8-9 November**

The Paris Pact Initiative is the only global cooperation mechanism dedicated to combating illicit traffic in opiates originating in Afghanistan, a partnership made up of 58 countries and 23 organizations. The partnership's efforts to enhance cooperation are enshrined under the four thematic pillars outlined in the Vienna Declaration: (a) strengthening and implementing regional initiatives; (b) detecting and blocking financial flows linked to illicit traffic in opiates; (c) preventing the diversion of precursor chemicals used in illicit opiates manufacturing in Afghanistan; and (d) reducing drug abuse and dependence through a comprehensive approach.

The first pillar of the Vienna Declaration on regional initiatives aims to:

 - strengthen the capacity of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan and its institutions to combat opiates;
 - provide support to the most affected transit States;
 - facilitate cross-border operations between law enforcement agencies;
 - enhance border management coordination;
 - support the implementation of comprehensive regional programmes to counteract opiate challenges and threats;
 - continue addressing the gap in evidence for action.

Expert level discussion under the auspices of the Paris Pact framework serves to identify counter narcotics priorities and highlight efforts taking place to combat opiate trafficking along the major routes.
- 3. Japan, Russian Federation and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, A Partnership in support of 'Law Enforcement Capacity Building for West and Central Asia' Brochure, which was prepared for the high-level side event of the 61st Session of the Commission on Narcotic Drugs, March 2018**

The Database on Law Enforcement Training for Europe, West and Central Asia was officially launched during a high-level side event at the 61st Session of the Commission on Narcotic Drugs, March 2018.

- 4. "Declaration on the Cooperation between Japan, the Russian Federation and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime to support counter narcotics efforts of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan," signed in Vienna on 12 November 2018**

A declaration was signed on 12 November 2018, highlighting Trilateral Cooperation efforts between UNODC, Japan and Russia to support counter narcotics efforts of the Government of Afghanistan. The successful partnership, which is contributing to enhancing the interdiction efforts and regional cooperation, has proven to be among good practices under the principle of common and shared responsibility for addressing and countering the world drug problem. This partnership is contributing to the implementation of Resolution 60/9 adopted at the 60th Session of the Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) in March 2017. The Trilateral Cooperation is further expanding with the recent launch of the new project on the establishment of a counter narcotics canine (K9) unit in Afghanistan in October 2018.
